Grit and Diamonds

The exhibition in partnership with Glasgow Women's Library is a collection of archive materials in relation to two chapters from the book *Grit and Diamonds*. The book focuses on women as active and important contributors to Glasgow's history between 1980 and 1990 following very masculine narratives in Glasgow's approach to being a European City of Culture in 1990.
